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1. Introduction

The Trust intends and expects that all decisions, policies and procedures will be underpinned at all times by its vision and values:

Our aim:

TPAT – Inspiring futures, empowering people.

We aim to benefit our communities by nurturing well-educated, aspirational and creative young people. We exist to inspire futures and empower all our people. We achieve this by enriching and fulfilling our employees with the investment to become masters of their craft, all working together to realise exceptional outcomes for young people

To achieve this our schools will:

- Create an aspirational, driven, and highly engaging educational environment where every pupil can succeed.
- Commit to knowing each pupil individually and empowering them to excel.
- Deliver the highest quality learning opportunities facilitated by excellent teachers.
- Inspire our pupils to become confident, motivated and respectful individuals ready to make a positive contribution to society.

The Trust will support our schools by:

- Providing the resources and stability schools need to work efficiently and effectively, overcoming challenges and prioritising education every day.
- Providing a platform for collaboration, sharing excellence and experience, and fostering unity and shared purpose.
- Nurturing our Trust's 'culture of improvement' where staff thrive in a safe, supportive network, embracing feedback and professional dialogue to drive sustainable improvement.

1.1 Aims

This policy is to ensure the online safety of all children, staff members, trustees, volunteers and visitors.

This will be accomplished through:

- Robust filtering and monitoring processes in place to ensure the online safety of everyone through differentiated user-based filtering provided by Exa networks SurfProtect, and device monitoring and reporting provided by Securus.
- Delivering an effective approach to online safety, cross Trust, which empowers us to protect by establishing clear mechanisms to identify, intervene and record.
- Providing clear boundaries of acceptable online behaviour.
- Appropriate use of Trust resources, both internally and remotely.
- Providing clarity of when schools should intervene with online safety issues.
- Regular information sharing and sign posting for parent advice.

1.2 Legislation and Guidance

This policy is based on the Department for Education's (DfE) statutory safeguarding guidance, [Keeping Children Safe in Education](#), and its advice for schools on:

2. Filtering and Monitoring Procedures

2.1 Filtering

The filtering of internet content provides an essential means of preventing users from accessing material that is illegal, harmful or inappropriate in an educational context.

The filtering system cannot, however, provide a 100% guarantee that it will do so, as online content changes dynamically and new technologies are constantly being developed. It is important, therefore, to understand that filtering is only one element in a larger strategy for online safety and acceptable use.

Internet access is filtered for all users. Differentiated internet access is available for staff and customised filtering changes are managed by Trust IT Support. Illegal content is filtered by Exa networks, the Trust broadband and filtering provider. Exa actively employ the Internet Watch Foundation URL list and other illegal content lists, as well as proactively monitoring for changes to the wider Internet and blocking sites accordingly. There is a clear route for reporting and managing changes to the filtering system via the TPAT Hub.

Where personal devices are allowed internet access through the school network, filtering will be applied that is consistent with school practice. A secure certificate (SSL) must be installed to enable decryption of Internet traffic, to maintain compliance with the DfE standards for Internet safety.

SurfProtect, the Trust Internet filtering solution is updated daily by Exa networks, and applied across all:

- Users, including guest and visitors
- Trust owned devices and systems
- Any device or user that makes use of the network or facilities, such as guest Wifi

This system:

- Filters all Internet traffic, across both Leased Line (Main) and ADSL/Fibre (Backup) connectivity
- Adheres to standards mandated by the DfE, and are an active member of the IWF
- Is capable of handling multilingual web content, images, common misspellings and abbreviations
- Identifies technologies and techniques that allow users to get around the filtering such as VPNs and proxy services and blocks them
- Utilises user-based filtering across all devices to determine the type of user (staff, student) and applies the appropriate filtering policy to them
- Provides alerts when any web content has been blocked
- Is regularly updated
- Decrypts encrypted content (known as SSL Decryption or SSL Inspection) to ensure search terms and secure websites are adequately filtered

2.2 Monitoring

Monitoring user activity on Trust devices is an important part of providing a safe environment for staff and students. Unlike Internet filtering, it does not stop users from accessing material through internet searches or software. Monitoring allows the review of user activity on Trust devices. For monitoring to be effective it must pick up incidents urgently, usually through alerts or observations, allowing prompt action to be taken.

TPAT utilises Securus fully managed service to actively monitor all Trust owned devices. This operates by having a small piece of software installed on all Trust devices that is actively scanning the screen, reading content, searches etc and logs accordingly.

Any alerts are reviewed centrally by the Securus safeguarding team, who will flag and alert as appropriate. These are then notified to DSLs within individual schools for action. Dependant on the severity, this could be via an e-mail alert, or, in the event of serious risk or harm to a child, via telephone call to DSL teams until someone can be reached.

Securus also integrates with CPOMS to allow for the automated logging of events on a child's individual record.

The Trust also make use of Impero to monitor devices across all schools. Staff in their respective schools have the ability to view student laptops and desktops via a console, and take appropriate behavioural action.

2.3 Testing

Regular testing takes place at DSL meetings termly, and at the host site. This includes a range of devices, including staff and student iPads, Laptops, Desktops as appropriate, and using generated logons for the event. These searches are logged in minutes of the meeting, as well as by the representative from senior IT Support in this [spreadsheet](#), available on the TPAT Hub to DSLs only.

We also ensure that www.testfiltering.com is tested live in meetings, and the result recorded.

In the event any test results in a negative result, immediate action is taken and mitigations documented.

2.4 Changes and Updates to Filtering and Monitoring

If a website is blocked, and a member of staff believes they should have access, they may request whitelisting through the TPAT Hub or IT Helpdesk. This will be checked for content and appropriateness before being actioned by a senior member of the IT Team.

No changes are permitted where it would alter the effectiveness of the default IWF block lists.

Any changes are recorded in the change log, accessible to IT Support.

2.5 Training and Awareness

It is a statutory requirement in England that staff receive training, at least annually, about safeguarding, child protection, online safety and filtering and monitoring.

All Staff, Governors and Trustees are made aware of the expectations of them:

- At induction
- Annual training / refresher training
- Policy requirements / updates
- Through the ICT Acceptable Usage Policy
- Regular updates throughout the year

Those with specific responsibilities around filtering and monitoring will receive additional training and support as needed, and to continually review the effectiveness.

Students are made aware of the expectations of them:

- In lessons and assemblies
- Through ICT Acceptable Usage Policy – delivered either in lesson or published via website for discussion with parents
- Home school agreements

***Appendix 1 Reporting Concerns Flowchart**

All new staff members will receive training, as part of their induction, on safe internet use and online safeguarding issues including cyber-bullying and the risks of online radicalisation.

All staff members will receive refresher training at least once each academic year as part of safeguarding training, as well as relevant updates as required (for example through emails, bulletins and staff meetings).

The DSL and deputies will undertake child protection and safeguarding training, which will include online safety, at least every 2 years. They will also update their knowledge and skills on the subject of online safety at least annually.

Trust Board members will receive training on safe internet use and online safeguarding issues as part of their safeguarding training.

Volunteers will receive appropriate training and updates, if applicable.

More information about safeguarding training is set out in our safeguarding and child protection policy.

Reporting will be overseen by the DSL / DDSL / OSL.

3.1 The Trust Board

The Trust Board has overall responsibility for monitoring this policy and holding the headteacher to account for its implementation.

The Trust Board will co-ordinate regular meetings with appropriate staff to discuss online safety and monitor online safety logs as provided by the designated safeguarding lead (DSL).

All Trust Board members will:

- Ensure that they have read and understand this policy.
- Agree and adhere to the terms on acceptable use of the school's ICT systems and the internet (see Trust ICT Acceptable Usage Policy).

3.2 The Headteacher / Principal

The headteacher is responsible for ensuring that staff understand this policy, and that it is being implemented consistently throughout the school, with guidance from the Online Safety Lead.

3.3 The Designated Safeguarding Lead and Deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead

Details of the school's DSL, DDSL and OSL are set out in our child protection and safeguarding policy.

The DSL takes lead responsibility for online safety in school, in particular:

- Supporting the headteacher in ensuring that staff understand this policy and that it is being implemented consistently throughout the school through engagement with the Online Safety Lead.
- Working with the headteacher, Trust IT Support and other staff, as necessary, to address any online safety issues or incidents.
- Ensuring that any online safety incidents are logged and dealt with appropriately in line with this policy.
- Ensuring that any incidents of online bullying are logged and dealt with appropriately in line with the school behaviour policy.

- CPOMS entries that are related to Online behaviours or incidents are shared with the Online Safety Lead when / if appropriate.
- Updating and delivering staff training on online safety with support from the Online Safety Lead.
- Liaising with other agencies and / or external services if necessary.
- Providing regular reports on online safety in school to the headteacher and / or Trust Board with input from the Online Safety Lead.
- Regularly reviewing the monitoring alerts and logs produced by the Securus managed monitoring service.

This list is not intended to be exhaustive.

3.4 The Online Safety Lead

The lead for online safety is responsible for:

- Ensuring effective teaching and learning of online safety.
- Ensuring online safety issues are embedded in all aspects of the school.
- Raising awareness of online safety issues within the school and wider community.

3.5 Trust IT Support

The Trust IT Support team is responsible for:

- Putting in place appropriate filtering and monitoring systems, which are updated on a regular basis, blocking access to potentially dangerous sites and where possible preventing the downloading of potentially dangerous files.
- Ensuring that the Trust IT systems are secure and protected against viruses and malware, and that such safety mechanisms are updated regularly.
- Ensuring that any online safety or cyber-bullying incidents are referred to the relevant parties as described in this policy.
- Ensuring that Monitoring solutions are active and fit for purpose.

This list is not intended to be exhaustive.

3.6 All Staff and Volunteers

All staff, including contractors and agency staff, and volunteers are responsible for:

- Maintaining an understanding of this policy.
- Adhering to this policy consistently alongside the Trust ICT Acceptable Usage Policy.
- Ensuring that any online safety or cyber-bullying incidents are logged.

- Making sure that children are regularly reminded of their responsibilities regarding online safety and behaviour.

This list is not intended to be exhaustive.

3.7 Parents

Parents play a crucial role in ensuring that their children understand the need to use the technology in an appropriate way. The Trust will support parents to understand these issues through parents' evenings, newsletters, letters, website, social media and information about national / local online safety campaigns / literature.

Parents are expected to:

- Notify a member of staff or the headteacher of any concerns or queries regarding this policy.
- Ensure their child has read, understood, and agreed to the terms on the Trust ICT Acceptable Usage policy.

3.8 Visitors and Members of the Community

Visitors and members of the community who use the Trust IT systems or internet will be made aware of this policy, when relevant, and expected to read and follow it. If appropriate, they will be expected to agree to the terms on IT and Acceptable Usage and Mobile Telephones.

All staff should be aware of the content of this policy, and how it applies to themselves, children Parents / Guardians, Visitors, and members of the community.

4. Educating Children about Online Safety

Children will be taught about online safety and the potential harm, the effects of their online actions on others and knowing how to recognise and display respectful behaviour online. Children will receive the help and support of the school to recognise and avoid online safety risks and build their resilience.

Children will be taught the breadth of issues categorised into four areas of risk:

- Content: being exposed to illegal, inappropriate or harmful content, for example, pornography, fake news, racism, misogyny, self-harm, suicide, antisemitism, radicalisation and extremism.
- Contact: being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users; for example, peer to peer pressure, commercial advertising, and adults posing as children or young adults with the intention to groom or exploit them for sexual, criminal, financial or other purposes.
- Conduct: personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm; for example, making, sending and receiving explicit images (e.g., consensual and non-consensual sharing of nudes and semi-nudes and / or pornography, sharing other explicit images and online bullying.
- Commerce: risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and / or financial scams.

The computing curriculum covers the principles of online safety at all key stages, with progression in the content to reflect the different and escalating risks that pupils face. This includes how to use technology safely, responsibly, respectfully and securely, and where to go for help and support when they have concerns about content or contact on the internet or other online technologies.

Children should learn what positive, healthy and respectful relationships look like, following a scheme of work. In addition, teachers will also respond to any particular issues and concerns with individuals and classes as and when they arise, referring to the Online Safety Lead when appropriate.

Key online safety messages will also be reinforced across all areas of the curriculum. Children will be taught in all lessons to be critically aware of the materials / content they access on-line and be guided to validate the accuracy of information. Children will be taught to acknowledge the source of information used and to respect copyright when using material accessed on the internet. Schools will use assemblies to raise children's awareness of the dangers that can be encountered online and may also invite speakers to talk to children about this.

The Trust will raise parents' awareness of online safety in letters or other communications home, and in information via our website. This policy will also be shared with parents via newsletter and online link on Trust website.

5. Educating Parents about Online Safety

There is information about keeping children safe online (including social media, apps and gaming) available on School websites. Schools will regularly communicate with parents with information on trends, apps and developments as appropriate via newsletters and e-mail.

6. Child on Child Abuse via Digital Technologies

All staff should be aware that children can abuse other children (often referred to as child-on-child abuse), and that it can happen both inside and outside of school and online. All staff should be clear as to the school's policy and procedures with regard to child-on-child abuse and the important role they have to play in preventing it and responding where they believe a child may be at risk from it.

Child-on-child abuse via digital technologies is most likely to include, but may not be limited to:

- Bullying (including cyberbullying, prejudice-based and discriminatory bullying)
- Consensual and non-consensual sharing of nude and semi-nude images and/or videos (also known as sexting or youth produced sexual imagery)

7. Digital Communications

The Trust expects that all staff will ONLY communicate with Students and Parents via secure Trust approved systems, that can be monitored.

Where these are outside or pre-existing relationships, please refer to the Staff Code of Conduct.

8. Acceptable Use of the Internet in School

Where a child misuses the Trust technology, we will follow the procedures set out in the ICT Acceptable Usage Policy. The action taken will depend on the individual circumstances, nature and seriousness of the specific incident, and will be proportionate.

Where a staff member misuses Trust technology or a personal device where the action constitutes misconduct, the matter will be dealt with in accordance with the Staff Code of Conduct and our allegations management policy. Action taken will depend on the individual circumstances, nature and seriousness of the specific incident. The school will consider whether incidents which involve illegal activity or content, or otherwise serious incidents, should be reported to the Police.

All children, parents, staff, volunteers, Governors and Trustees are expected to sign the Trust Acceptable Usage Policy. Use of Trust technology must be for educational purposes only, or for the purpose of fulfilling the duties of an individual's role. We will monitor the websites visited by children, staff, volunteers, Governors, Trustees and visitors to ensure they comply with the above.
