

New Computing Scheme of Work

- The new national curriculum for computing has been developed to equip young people with the foundational skills, knowledge and understanding of computing they will need for the rest of their lives.
- It focuses on:
 - Learning how computers and computer systems, including the Internet work.
 - The opportunities computing offers for communication and collaboration.
 - Using search technologies effectively and supporting them to become discerning in evaluating digital content and its reliability.
 - Selecting, using and combining a variety of software on a range of digital devices to design and create a range of programs, systems and content to collect, analyse, evaluate and present data and information.
 - Using technology safely, respectfully and responsibly; recognising acceptable/unacceptable behaviour and identifying a range of ways to report concerns about content and contact.

92% of children reported that we teach e-safety well at Red Oaks with 73% saying very well.






What do you think the majority of Key Stage children at Red Oaks are using technology/the internet for?

Our KS2 children: use of Technology

- Tablets (71%), SMART TV's (70%), games consoles (68%) and laptops (62%) are the most popular form of internet use outside of school. Almost half use a desktop computer and almost one third an e-book reader. Over half use the internet on a mobile phone.
- 30% of children are spending more than 3 hours on a games console a day, 25% on an ipad and 24% a Smart TV.



- It appears our children are mainly using the internet for watching videos/creating content, gaming, text, photo and video messaging and child-friendly social networking sites. Only 6% are on Facebook and 4% on Twitter.
- 90% do not have an account/friends on social networking sites such as Facebook,
 Snapchat, Instagram and Twitter.

ZIP IT

Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online.



BLOCK IT

Block people who send nasty messages and don't open unknown links and attachments.




FLAG IT

The 'Net effect'

How the Internet changes the equation...

- Disinhibition: Lack of visual cues reduces empathy
- Persistence & searchability: A permanent easily searchable archive
- Replicability: ability to copy and paste from anywhere, to anywhere in a split second
- Scalability: high potential visibility
- Invisible audiences: you never know who's watching
- Blurring of public and private: boundaries not clear






Are you a 'sharent'?

For many children online life begins before birth, when their excited parents-to-be post ultrasound images on social media. According to a recent poll, the average parent will share their child's image online nearly 1000 times before their fifth birthday (The Parent Zone, 2015). For parent bloggers the total is likely to be double that, or more.

Concerned?

If you're worried about your child and think something is not quite right, it's best to be on the safe side and find out more.

New site check list

- ➤ What can you do? What's its purpose? Functions of the site or technologies picture sharing? Chat? Webcam? IM?
- > Is there a parent/carer section?
- > How do you **report** a problem?
- > Can the account/profile be made **private**?
- ➤ Does it have any **parental controls**? E.g. time limitations, how much money is spent, emails sent to your account?

Join yourself & see what all the fuss is about! Always remember that nothing online is 100% safe – there is always the potential for misuse either by adults/children.





Our KS2 children & cyberbullying

- If they were cyberbullied, it would be a parent that they were most likely to tell (54%).
- When cyberbullied recently, 20% didn't tell anybody, 13% told another adult outside school, 7% a friend, 6% a teacher and 0% another adult in school.
- The number of children being cyberbullied continues to drop 8% compared to 12% in 2013 and 15% in 2011.
- 58% of these children were bullied on online games, 14% via email, 8% by text, instant messaging or a social networking site.








Our KS2 children: staying safe online

• The number of children who have met someone in real life that they've only met online before – either with a friend, parent or alone has remained static at between 17/18% for the last 4 years. 6% have met a stranger alone that they met online and 7% took a friend. That's 27 children in total this year.




Shopping that stays inside smart limits

Kids can get what they want with the money that you add to their Microsoft accounts. They won't need your credit card, and we won't let them buy stuff that's too old for them.



Find your kids on a map

No more "where are you?" when kids have their Windows phones turned on. Adults in the family can use their phones to make sure that their kids are OK.



Activity reports let you check up on your kids' online activity. If you need to, you can block specific apps, games or websites.
